- 3) What policy instruments, programs, and processes need to be put in place for the development of a national vision and practices that foster resilient agricultural systems and advance sustainable development in Canada? Points to consider:
 - What is achievable, what are good timelines?
 - What are the challenges?
 - Who will do what?
 - How do we move forward?
 - Who is needed on board and how do we get them involved?

Speakers' Biographies:

<u>Jean-Charles Le Vallée</u>, Ph.D, is an agricultural economist and food/nutrition security and environment specialist with 15 years of experience in development and extensive research, policy, and work experience relating Sub-Saharan, Central American, Canadian, and Inuit food security through ITK, CIDA, USAID, FAO, PAHO, IFPRI, the World Food Prize, and the World Bank. He teaches food policy at Ryerson University, and food and social justice the University of Ottawa. Jean-Charles also recently launched his new book from VDM publishing on Achieving Food Security through Food System Resilience.

<u>Mike Schreiner</u> is the co-founder and Vice President of Local Food Plus. He is an award-winning social entrepreneur who comes to LFP after 10 years as the co-founder of WOW Foods, a Toronto-based home delivery service for organic food that aims to build a healthy food system by linking consumers with local organic farmers. Mike was also the founder of the LETS Community Shared Agriculture project which worked to link a local organic farm with members in Toronto using a local currency and work share arrangements, as well as the co-founder of Earthdance Organics, an organic food service kitchen and bakery. Mike grew up on a conventional grain and livestock farm. He holds Bachelor Degrees in Business Administration and History, as well as a Masters Degree in History. Mike is a former member of the Toronto Food Policy Council and is active in other community and environmental efforts, including efforts to establish a local and environmental business network in the Greater Toronto Area.
